#### A Message from Fr. Steve: Bells and Smells

As we walked into the church—the House of God—what do we remember on a sensory level? For me, growing up, it was the distinct aroma of extinguished candles. The smoke would rise gently, swirling toward the vaulted ceiling until it hung like a veil above the congregation. That scent—warm wax and faint incense—filled the sanctuary and became imprinted in my memory.

My childhood church also had a bell tower. One of my most treasured memories was being allowed to pull the bell rope on Sunday mornings at eight and ten o'clock. I would brace myself and give it several strong tugs until the bell pealed through the neighborhood, proclaiming the beginning of worship. It felt like I was summoning the community with sound, calling everyone into a sacred worship.

I remember the changing colors of the church year—vibrant greens, solemn purples, glowing whites—reflected in the banners and vestments. These colors told the story of the liturgical seasons, signaling shifts in our spiritual journey and drawing the eyes and heart toward deeper attentiveness. The space itself—its warmth, its radiance, its beauty—helped center me and draw me into the mystery of worship.

Worship engages all our senses: the sights of seasonal color and stained glass, the smell of incense or candle wax, the sounds of hymnody and bell chimes, the feel of kneeling or standing, the taste of Eucharist shared. Even our bodily movements—bowing, standing, sitting, kneeling, making the sign of the cross—connect us more fully to the sacred experience. Each element invites us to participate wholeheartedly.

You may have heard the phrase 'smells and bells'—a shorthand for the ritual richness of Episcopal and other liturgical traditions. While incense may spark mixed reactions (and a few coughs), bells are more often met with delight. There's a joy in their sound—both beautiful and purposeful—woven into the rituals that shape our faith.

One particular kind of bell, the Sanctus bell or altar bell, plays a powerful role in worship. Often used during the Eucharist in traditions like Roman Catholic, Anglican, Episcopal, and some Lutheran churches, these bells draw our attention to the holiest moments of the service. They remind us—clearly and reverently—of the transformation taking place before us.

Traditionally rung during the Sanctus—the part of the liturgy when we proclaim, 'Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of hosts'—these bells reach their most poignant use during the consecration, when the priest lifts the Host and Chalice. Their clear tones mark the mystery and miracle, inviting focused awe as we witness bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. Reflecting the Trinity, they are often rung three times to emphasize the holiness and unity of the moment.

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Throughout history, bells have played a unifying and proclaiming role in the church. They have announced times of prayer, rung out joyous weddings, tolled in mourning at funerals, and marked the sacred passages of time. In many ways, they serve as the church's enduring voice—drawing us together with sound, proclaiming God's presence in every season.

I am filled with gratitude and joy to share that Trinity's Altar Guild has acquired new Sanctus bells. This beautiful and sacred addition to our worship is not only a generous offering but one that will echo through the life of our church for years to come. These bells will become part of our rhythm of praise—marking holy moments, shaping sacred memory, and inviting all who hear them to pause, look upward, and enter more deeply into the presence of God. We give thanks for this lasting gift and for the faithful hands that brought it to us.

#### The Book Club July 12th, 2025


The book club meets in the Library from 9:30-11:00am the 2nd Saturday of each month.



### Altar Flower Donations


Flowers for the Altar provide a lovely way to offer a thanksgiving or remembrance of a loved one or a special event. More than






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
